











Where will my child sleep at camp?

There are two lodges on the campgrounds that we utilize for our elementary age campers. The first lodge is at the center of camp. This lodge has bunk rooms on the ground level, with the dining hall directly above. One bunk room with a large bathroom is set aside for 2nd-3rd grade boys and the other bunk room is for 2nd-3rd grade girls. A short walk across the main fields of camp is where you'll find the other lodge. This lodge boasts four bunk rooms. Two rooms, with a bathroom in between, are set aside for our 4th and 5th grade boys. The other two rooms and bathroom are set aside for the 4th & 5th grade girls. There is a common area and kitchenette providing space between the boys and girls rooms.

How is the camp staffed?

UALC rents out a good portion of Woodland Lakes Camps. That means, that Woodland Lakes staffs the daytime activities we rent out from them. They staff the dining hall, lifeguard team, ropes course instructors, and custodial crew. UALC provides the rest of the staff. You may recognize parents from the congregation as well as teens from the community who serve as adult and teen counselors. All of our staff and volunteers go through rigorous safeguarding and training programs prior to serving with your children. We also travel with a camp clinic aid who manages distributing medication. This year we will also travel with a pediatrician as one of our adult volunteers.

Will my child be with their friends?

The overall answer is, YES! However, grade and gender determine how much they'll be with friends. Children finishing 2nd & 3rd grade of the same gender will be in the same cabins and walking groups. The same is true of 4th & 5th graders of the same gender. This allows for the most amount of time with other children of the same gender, in your same grade group. Free time is offered every afternoon, during which time, children have a variety of activities from which to choose. At this time they are permitted to play on the grounds with anyone in our camp; however, they are not permitted to go back to anyone else's cabin. During other activities, children are encouraged to sit with their cabin groups, but will certainly interact with the other cabins throughout the day.

What happens if my child gets hurt or homesick?

It is very rare that, once settled in for the first night, a child becomes sick, hurt, or homesick enough to need to go home. As mentioned above, we have trained staff, as well as a pediatrician on our team who will come alongside your child to work through hurt or frustration they are feeling. We keep in contact with parents if a child expresses any ailment and will provide time for you to talk with your child, in situations where that might help them adjust or feel better. Camp is a two hour drive from Columbus. On occasion, parents have come early to pick up children who are especially homesick or become ill. This is a rarity, but we are willing to do whatever it takes to make sure your child is safe and comfortable.
